Brower Youth Awards

Since its founding over 20 years ago by David Brower, Earth Island Institute has been a powerful force for leadership development as well as environmental change. Brower found inspiration in the vitality of young people, and he consistently championed youth leadership. He believed, as did Margaret Mead, in the idea of “This Island Earth,” a unique source of life, not replicated anywhere in the universe. Brower inspired fellow environmentalists and taught them — young and old — the power of their own commitment. He reminded audiences again and again of Goethe’s words: “Anything you can do, or dream you can, begin it. Boldness has genius, power, and magic in it.”

The Brower Youth Awards, begun in 2000, are the only national environmental awards for youth activists that carry with them a substantial cash prize of \$3,000. Each winner is honored at a ceremony held in Brower’s hometown of Berkeley, California. From there they embark upon a series of leadership development, mentoring, and networking activities aimed at furthering their activism and launching the next generation of environmental heroes. These prestigious awards are bestowed on those whose work on behalf of communities and the environment epitomizes the principles of Conservation, Preservation and Restoration—what Brower called “CPR for the Earth.”

Brower was fond of reminding us “there is no such thing as a permanent environmental victory — only a stay of execution.” We in the environmental movement are finding this truer than ever today, as the current administration rolls back hard-won environmental protections. Developing new environmental leaders who are committed to this long-term struggle is crucial to the survival of the Earth as we know it.

2002 Brower Youth Award Recipients

Clockwise from left:

Jessian Choy, age 21, of Santa Cruz, CA, for founding the University of California, Santa Cruz Student Environmental Center (SEC), a new model for involving students in planning campus policies that protect the environment. In its first year, SEC's diverse coalition has advanced 15 campus greening projects and petitioned the University to comply with the Kyoto Protocol on global warming.

Max Harper, age 20, of Hotchkiss, CO, for developing a sustainable living theme house that was adopted as a model by Colorado College to engage students and administrators in environmental sustainability and to build a community epicenter of campus activism.

Stefanie Lacy, age 17, of Bandera, TX, for establishing a paper recycling program in the "Cowboy Capital of the World" that has diverted 280 tons of paper from a landfill, saving nearly 4,600 trees.

Amir Nadav, age 17, of Eagan, MN, whose efforts to reduce his fellow Minnesota students' exposure to dangerous diesel exhaust led to the passage of statewide legislation that bans excessive idling of school buses and requires schools to relocate air-intake vents away from parking areas.

Ethan Schaffer, age 21, of Sagle, ID, creator of Organic Volunteers (www.OrganicVolunteers.com), a national outreach and education program for sustainability and organic food systems as solutions to both health and environmental problems.

Nathan Wyeth, age 17, of Chevy Chase, MD, Co-Founder and Chair of Student Action on the Global Economy (SAGE), created in response to the environmental threats posed by the current model of globalization. SAGE has used public protest, lobbying of Congress, and public education to halt the continued weakening of U.S. environmental laws and exploitation of people in less wealthy countries by international trade and development policy.

CONSERVATION PRESERVATION RESTORATION

2002 Selected Project Highlights

Baikal Watch broke ground on the Great Baikal Trail, which will be approximately 2,000 miles long and will encircle Lake Baikal. They will bring in hundreds of local and international volunteers to help design and build the trail, a project that is expected to take a minimum of ten years to complete.

...Completed an EIA (environmental impact assessment) with various Baikal groups on a proposed 2,000 mile oil and gas pipeline that would run from Baikal to China. They have supplied dozens of local grassroots groups located along the proposed route with information educating them on the potential effects of the pipeline. They are working with the National Parks and other groups in the region to prepare a lawsuit preventing the construction of this illegal pipeline.

...Helped compile the first Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) on a prospective uranium mine in the Republic of Buryatia, successfully delaying its development.

Bay Area Wilderness Training conducted a special camping trip in Yosemite National Park for the six recipients of the 2002 Brower Youth Awards, an awards program established in 2000 that honors youth environmental achievement in the areas of conservation, preservation and restoration.

The Borneo Project assisted villagers from Long Lawen in completing the first community-owned and operated micro-hydroelectricity system in Sarawak. The system now provides continuous renewable energy to 80 families, powering lights at night and cottage industries during the day.

Center for Safe Energy completed a three-year training and grant program for women's NGO (nongovernmental organization) leadership in Kazakhstan.

Global Service Corps launched international health internship programs in Tanzania and Thailand for pre-med and healthcare students as well as healthcare professionals interested in international healthcare.

...Established a sustainable agriculture training site at Tengeru Agricultural College in Arusha, Tanzania.

Grassroots Globalization Network expanded their Community Solutions Campaign, which highlights a bottom-up approach to sustainable development.

...Published *The Informed Activist*, a guide to progressive activist issues on the Internet. The guide lists over 700 web sites and is printed on 100% post-consumer waste paper.

International Marine Mammal Project

(IMMP) hosted the daily activist newsletter, “ECO,” a publication detailing the proceedings of the 2002 International Whaling Commission (IWC). ECO is written and published by representatives of nonprofit environmental and animal welfare organizations that attend the annual IWC meetings, and is edited by the International Marine Mammal Project.

... Provided over \$140,000 in loans to local fishermen and whale-watching guides in San Ignacio Lagoon, Baja, Mexico, for the purchase of four-stroke motors. These motors emit far less air and water pollution and are significantly quieter than two-stroke motors, thus benefiting both the whales and the indigenous ecotourism industry ... played a key role in the release of Keiko, the orca star of the film *Free Willy*, into the waters surrounding his native Iceland. Keiko is now swimming free in Norway with IMMP overseeing his ongoing rehabilitation and welfare.

... Continued their campaign against Low Frequency Active (LFA) Sonar to block this destructive U.S. Navy noise bombardment from harming whales and other marine life. The Bush administration sought to exempt the U.S. Navy from the Marine Mammal Protection Act. IMMP was successful in blocking this legislation in Congress.

... Continued their extremely successful tuna-monitoring program, ensuring that tuna supplies remain truly “dolphin safe,” while expanding their coverage to several new companies.

John Muir Project stopped the logging of nearly 20,000 acres of mature and old growth forests in the Sierra Nevada.

Kids for the Bay trained 120 teachers to facilitate environmental education programs in the San Francisco Bay area.

... Workshops inspired 3,000 elementary school students, 120 teachers, and approximately 500 parents to participate in habitat restoration, pollution reduction, and safe bay food consumption.

Ma’at Youth Academy published and distributed a Public Health Advisory, cautioning individuals about the dangers of methylmercury in fish caught from San Francisco Bay.

... Disseminated public and environmental health information to over 5000 people through public speeches, panel discussions, and forums, thus building capacity in communities of color and low-income areas to significantly reduce public exposure to environmental hazards.

... Helped defeat plans for locating yet another power plant in Richmond, California.

Mangrove Action Project opened a second regional office in Bali, Indonesia, to partner with Indonesian NGO's (nongovernmental organizations) and fisherfolk communities in mangrove rehabilitation, environmental education, and the creation of a Coastal Community Resource Center. ... Advisor and co-founder Pisit Charnsnoh was a recipient of the Goldman Environmental Prize.

Sacred Land Film Project's feature length film, *In the Light of Reverence*, originally nationally broadcast on PBS TV in 2001, was made available in 2002 for community screenings. A corresponding Teacher's Guide and DVD were also completed.

Sustainable World Coalition held the World Sustainability Hearing in Johannesburg, South Africa, as a parallel event to the World Summit on Sustainable Development. The hearing featured 113 panelists and witnesses from 42 countries, including Jane Goodall and over half of the Goldman Environmental Prize winners.

West Africa Rainforest Network U.S. trained over 150 Nigerian activists in fundraising, organizational development, marketing and media relations.

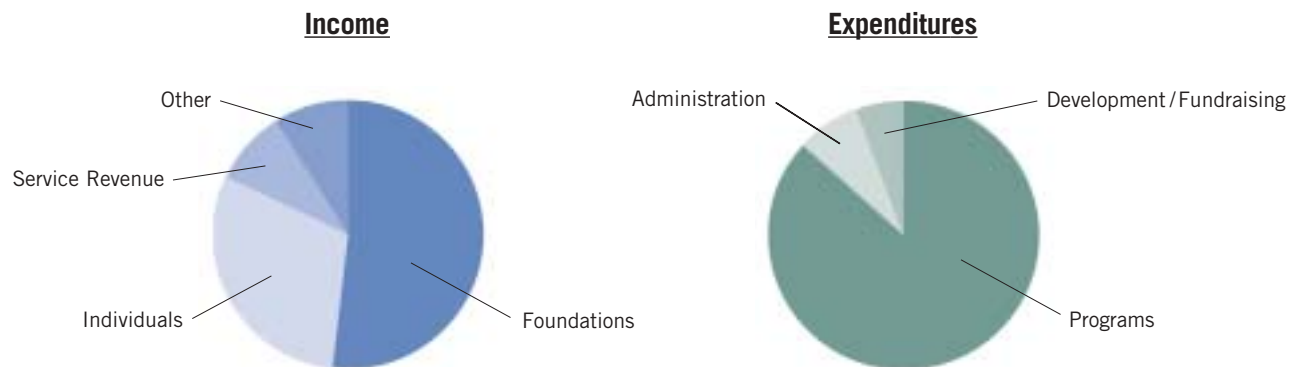
